Chaverim Yekarim – Dear Friends,

One of the most powerful lessons of the Megillah is how close the miraculous deliverance of the Jewish people was to not happening. Had Esther not summoned the courage to speak up at the right moment, the outcome could

have been devastating. Her bravery reminds us that using our voices, even in the face of great challenges, can change everything.

These are difficult days for Israel and Jews worldwide. Many ask, "How can we help Israel from here? How can we get a seat at the table? How can we support an inclusive, pluralistic, Jewish, and democratic Israel?" The most important way we can make an impact in the next two months is by voting for the MERCAZ USA slate in the 2025 World Zionist Congress elections.

Founded by Herzl in 1897, the World Zionist Congress (WZC) is our "seat at the table," allowing Jews worldwide to influence policies and funding priorities in Israel. The WZC and its affiliates are the four largest Jewish non-profits globally, and our votes shape their budgets and direction. Strong representation from MERCAZ USA in the World Zionist Congress influences the right of every Jew, regardless of their background or affiliation, to make aliyah and have full rights

to participate in religious life and that all Jews worldwide are supported in their identity and expression of Judaism. Participating in the election as American Jews is critical for maintaining our connection to Israel and provides funding for Zionist education opportunities for our children and communities.

It's crucial that extremist voices don't drown out the Conservative Movement's commitment to a pluralistic, democratic Israel.

Voting begins March 10 and ends on May 4th. Voting is simple—scan the QR code below or visit *zionistelection.org* to vote and encourage family and friends to do the same.

There is a lot of music—from opera to Yiddish songs to English children's songs—associated with the festival of Purim. The traditional melodies span from songs about increasing our joy during the month of Adar to songs about a wicked, wicked man and noshing on

hamantashen. George Frederick Handel wrote the well-known oratorio *Esther* in 1732. More recently, Hugo Weisgall composed an edgy opera, also called *Esther*, in 1993 to critical acclaim.

Aside from the above (and other) musical retellings of the Purim story, the quintessential music of Purim remains the chanting of *Megillat Esther*. In fact, Purim is the only festival for which the *megillah* <u>is</u> the holiday. Unlike all other Jewish holidays which exist to commemorate a historical event or an agricultural season, and unlike those holidays with deep theological rationale for existence, Purim cannot exist without Megillat Esther. It does not have a compelling claim to historical accuracy, nor does it claim either an agricultural or biblical importance.

Purim exists to tell a story, and that story is the *megillah*. Without it, we have no other basis for celebrating Purim, since all the *mitzvot* which we associate with Purim comes exclusively from the *megillah* itself. *Mishloach manot* (sending gifts), *matanot la-evyonim* (gifts to the poor), and the *seudah* (festive meal) are all derived from the primary commandment of Purim, to hear the chanting of the *megillah*. That is, although one could have the festival of Pesach without the chanting of the Song of Songs, or Shavuot without the chanting of Ruth or Sukkot without the chanting of *Kohelet*, there is quite literally no Purim without the chanting of *Megillat Esther*.

Ironically, in many respects Purim is analogous to the only other commemoration that is heavily dependent on its *megillah*, Tisha B'Av. In both cases, the trope melodies used to chant the *megillah* are unique to that one book. While the books of Ruth, Song of Songs and *Kohelet* all share a trope system, *Eicha* on Tisha B'Av and *Esther* on Purim are each singular and distinctive. And both help set the intended mood for the day – the mournful sounds of Eicha for Tisha B'Av, and the more festive tunes of *Megillat Esther* for Purim.

There is a Chasidic saying which describes the power of a melody as being able to take you from where you are to where you want to be. This year, I encourage you to listen carefully to the sounds of the chanting of the *megillah*. The music of *Megillat Esther*, the centerpiece of Purim, indeed plays a central role in reminding us that in the end, "for the Jews, there is light

and joy, happiness and honor." (Esther 8:16) Best wishes for a חג פורים שמח, a joyous and melodious Purim! ~Cantor Jamie Gloth


